Dear Fríends,

Thinking of Christmas adverts, I realise some people have been unhappy with the Marks and Spencer Christmas advert, but (and not calling to mind the issue with the colour of the Christmas hats in the first version of the M & S advert), I quite liked it. I liked it because it seemed to be suggesting we could do away with some of the things which keep us too busy during this time of year, especially if they do not bring us much joy.

While I am not saying the many items now associated with Christmas do not bring me joy, I do think we can all fill Christmas time up with too much -Some of which is actually unnecessary, though for some reason can seems vital this time of year. The danger of this, is that we can become too busy to enjoy the real meaning and reason of Christmas: Jesus being born, God loving us so much that he comes to us.

We hope that you and your families are all well.

We mentioned in our last Churchwardens' Notes that unfortunately we had discovered another leak in the roof. This time the



leak was above the clergy vestry. Our Leadwork Contractor has now visited and completed the necessary repairs.

One of the remaining items from the last Quinquennial Inspection was some re-pointing to the walls of our church. We have decided to use a local company were recommended to us by our friends in the Ness Group. The work can be carried out without the need for a Faculty so we have given the go-ahead to the selected company who have advised that the work should be carried out in the Spring.

Recently, we were contacted by a gentleman called Luke Fromant. Luke's Grandparents are buried in our churchyard. The grave is in a very poor state and Luke wants to have the grave repaired and refurbished. This work requires a Faculty and we have been assisting Luke with the Application process. The application process has now reached the point where a Public Notice has to be displayed at church for 28 days. This gives people the opportunity to raise any concerns they may have with the proposed work.

Unfortunately, we have had more issues with our heating. One of our two boilers is not working which means the system struggles to reach full temperature. We have extended the time the heating is on before services so hopefully the church will not be too cold. We are currently awaiting a date for the necessary work to be carried out. These are our last Notes before Christmas. We wish you all a Happy and Blessed Christmas.

For several years now we have supported the number one charity in the field of clean, sustainable water supplies and sanitation, namely WaterAid. We do this by writing one Christmas card (which could be one of those sold for Church funds!) to all members of our Church family which is displayed on one of the boards at the back of church. The money we save by not sending numerous cards we then donate to the charity.

Dirty water is the source of many diseases, especially in children, who often miss out on schooling through their illnesses. Lack of proper

toilets causes many girls to leave school once they hit puberty because there is no privacy to deal with their monthly periods.

771 million people around the world still have no clean water supply near to their home, which means someone in the family needs to spend hours a day trekking to find some, a job which often falls to the women and girls. Climate change is only exacerbating the problem.

Donations to WaterAid will be welcomed by our treasurer and envelopes from the charity are available at the back of church and can be put in the wall safe. We can also accept card donations please speak to Dorothy. Please include Gift Aid if you are a taxpayer.

Spend a day noticing how many times you turn on a tap to use water to drink, to wash with, to cook with or to flush the toilet (which we do with drinking water by the way - there is only one water supply to your house remember!). Then imagine what it would be like to be without this vital supply to your home or even somewhere nearby. So let's see what we can do – every penny helps. Thanks.

Ladies' Guild.

At our October meeting one of our members, Janis Hewitt, treated us to a most interesting talk about the Deepings Foodbank charity for which she is a volunteer.

The facility was formed back in 2013 by Churches Together affiliated under the model of the Trussel Trust. On 4th December that year they had their first clients. The Foodbank is totally run by wonderful volunteers.

Initially the venue was The Deepings School where at that time they had access to a room where clients waiting to collect their food could sit in comfort and chat with volunteers and receive not only their food but also help if they needed signposting to other organisations. Currently the Foodbank is held at the old Scout Headquarters in Deeping St James each Monday 2.30pm – 4pm but the venue sadly does not allow the clients the opportunity to sit and chat. However, most are just so happy to get a 3 day per person in the household supply of food, personal and household items for which they are very grateful. Presently the majority of the clients using the Foodbank self-refer but some come from referrals from schools or other organisations.

The food is donated via collection points in various places locally, a twice annual collection at Tesco who then very generously add to the collection, collections from schools and church harvest festivals and public donations.

Our members had all been asked to bring along an item from the list of items most needed at the current time and Janis thanked the members for their generosity. A cash donation was also given to allow them to purchase items that are much needed i.e. fresh fruit etc.

It was quite surprising that in 2023 so far 5694 days of food have been issued which equates to feeding 15 people every day of the year. So please, if you can, pop an item into their collection bin when you do your weekly shop to help those less fortunate. Our November meeting of Ladies Guild will see us crafting Christmas decorations. We will be folding books to make either angels or Christmas trees. There will no doubt be lots of chatter whilst we craft and enjoy refreshments! New members are always given a very warm welcome.

For our December meeting on the 19th we once more welcome Jules with Andy McCormack. They always make the meeting so entertaining - and as a bonus this year they are bringing along friends to accompany them.

A reminder to members - we have our post Christmas meal at the Horseshoe, Thurlby on 23rd January. Have you signed up yet?

Christmas Coffee Morning We will be delighted to welcome you to the Green School on Saturday 9th December from 10.30am for our special Christmas get together. In addition to the usual stalls selling cakes, books, and jigsaws we will have decorations for your tree, cards handmade by Pam and Greg, and novelties. Most of all there will be a friendly crowd, and a festive atmosphere not to be missed, so do come along, bringing a family member, friend, or neighbour with you. See you there!

St Guthlac's Eco Church

With the big Ho-Ho-Ho on the way, it's easy to start thinking of the many ways in which we can go to excess in our attempts to make this a great Christmas. And, after a few challenging years for many, it's understandable that we all want to have a time where we maximise our feelings of enjoyment, giving and sharing. But let's not get LOST. You may not be aware, but when it comes to reducing excess, I have a "Special set of skills". If you have met me, you may question this claim! But I'll explain:

I have worked in Manufacturing since Wham first sang about Last Christmas. In manufacturing we are constantly looking for ways to become more efficient, and the key to this is to reduce waste (Muda, as the Japanese would say it). Now, I have become something of a specialist in this, I even have a Black Belt. "In Origami?" I hear you say. No! However, I did once start a business in origami but, you guessed it, it folded!

But seriously, in manufacturing we are pretty ruthless, and consider waste as "anything unnecessary". Now, I wouldn't suggest going this far with Christmas, as that may preclude some of our less popular relatives from the dinner table. No, we need to be generous and giving, and stuffing one's face with second portions followed by Christmas pudding must be allowed, just on this day.

So, what can the world of Manufacturing Industry tell us about how to behave in our run-up to the festivities? Let's return to the Muda. There are considered to be seven categories of waste. Now this isn't one of my training sessions, otherwise I would bore you with all seven, examples of each category, and then test you at the end. I will, however, mention a few that seem somewhat relevant.

Overproduction – We aim to produce only what we know we can sell. If we produce too many, it's waste. If we are lucky, the extra products will sit around for a while, taking up valuable space before we can sell them. But at worse, they may end up in the skip. Does

this sound a bit like the food and presents that we buy thinking "I'm sure that will come in handy". I don't have any figures on the amount of food and gifts that get bought at Christmas but never used, but I'm sure that it has a significant impact on our planet's resources. A little thought and planning might help us to buy just what we know we need.

Motion and Transport – We are increasingly understanding the impact of moving goods around the planet. In manufacturing, we are more concerned about what it costs us financially to move items from A to B, and the time it takes. But, as we know, the various modes of transport produce carbon dioxide and other emissions at varying rates. As well as considering the air miles of the items we purchase, we could think about the miles that we cover when shopping. Buying locally has many positives, and Christmas fairs and markets can be great fun, getting us in the Christmas mood. However, if we do like to venture out to do a big day of Christmas shopping, what about using public transport? I can strongly recommend a train ride up to York to get a good Christmas vibe. But remember to draft a list first. Even Santa makes a list and checks it twice!

Inventory and Defects – Holding stock can be expensive and defective products can't be used. At home, we can consider what we are going to buy and when. I once worked with a chap who always bought his turkey on Christmas Eve, when the supermarkets started to reduce the prices. Now that introduces a risk that the turkeys might run out. But he always had a turkey!

We are thinking of having goose this year and we saw some in the supermarket at the weekend. We decided not to buy one yet because it would take up a lot of freezer space for a long time. This is the challenge with inventory – you don't want to risk failing to have want you want, when you need it, but you don't want your home being taken over by sprouts and chipolatas from the start of Advent.

If we buy some things too early, they may be defective by Christmas day, going past their sell-by date. There is the risk that the large pork pie that I buy a week before Christmas may not survive to see the big day. But that's more to do with having children still living at home!

So, there we are. I have passed on great wisdom, and you can now call yourselves Yellow Belts. Let's continue our crusade to remove waste from Christmas. But the caveat is that love and kindness are never a waste! And origami is a great skill to employ with your Christmas table napkins.
