

Dear Friends,

We are in that strange time of year when it is Advent, yet most of us have already started to turn our thoughts to Christmas. Getting ready for Christmas day celebrations links well with the advent theme of preparing for Christ's coming. As well as getting ready though, it also a time of waiting, and waiting is something many of us can find uncomfortable. We all face seasons of waiting in our own lives though —waiting for something to come, to happen or to change, waiting for something better or more joyful, as we sit, waiting in what can be a time of darkness.

At Christmas we celebrate Jesus as the light that shines in the darkness, offering warmth and love. It seems entirely appropriate then, that we have just installed a new heating and lighting system in the church. This is an expression of our mission to bring light and warmth into our community. It is also a practical way of offering hospitality by creating a comfortable place to meet together in friendship and fellowship.

In a similar way, we are launching a new bereavement café this month. This will be a safe place where those who have sadly experienced loss, can find warmth and welcome, care and companionship, and the offer of light in a difficult season.

Christmas is also about the presence of God coming into the world. We celebrate a God who loves us so much, that God came to be with us, offering guidance and light, relationship, compassion and hope. God chose to be close to us, offering the warmth of God's own presence. As God draws near to us, as a church we seek to

follow this and draw near to others. So this year our church is strengthening its presence in the community. Through the bereavement café we are seeking to offer support and company to those who might feel most alone, and we have created a physically warmer church building as a practical expression of our commitment to welcome all.

Christmas reminds us then, that God meets us where we are -In times of joy and the difficult, darker periods of waiting for better days. Advent reminds us of the promise then, that light and joy are coming – That God is coming to us in love, offering light and warmth. So, as we wait, we do so together, with each other and with God, trusting that celebration and joy, will come again. As a church we share this message with all, as we seek to share that warmth and welcome, light and hope with our community.

I wish you all a truly wonderful Christmas.

A Family Friendly Festive Service

1818: Oberndorf, Local Boys Done Good.

This story began when Mr and Mrs Gruber came with their caravan to stay a day or two on our paddock near Market Deeping Bridge.

Their caravan was a pleasant little one just right for a couple, and while being shown its amenities by the proud owners I commented on the string of triangular pennants of which there were several.

We could see that the flags were from the region of Austria / Germany that the Grubers had visited in their 'van. "He's a little touchy about the subject," she said, and it turned out he was a direct descendant of Franz Gruber who was instrumental in the creation of the Christmas Carol 'Silent Night'.

He was always somewhat reluctant to admit to the fact. I was spurred on to find the origin of the carol, correctly titled 'Stille Nacht, Heilige Nacht' created in Austria; firstly by a young priest in Mariap Farr (near Salzburg) named Joseph Mohr (lyrics in 1816) and Franz Xaver Gruber (music 1818).

Joseph pictured in six verses a calm still night and the peacefulness of the Holy Birth, not long after the Napoleonic troubles.

But a degree of panic! The time for Midnight Mass was but twentynine hours away at St Nikolaus Church in Oberndorf, and Gruber the Choir Director had no music for the carols! The organ was out of action! Legend has it that mice had chewed holes in the leather bellows! He hurriedly composed music to Father Mohr's words, a simple tune which could be played with a few basic chords by Mohr strumming on his guitar. The situation was saved!

Over the following years the resulting work was spread around Europe by travelling singers; being performed before the King of Prussia in 1834 for example, reaching New York in 1839. Variations were translated into three hundred languages. It was even sung in German, French and English simultaneously during the 1914 battlefield 'Christmas Truce'. The 'Stille Nacht, Heilige Naht Museum' in Hallein (€5 entry in 2024) occupies the Church House where Gruber lived for twenty-eight years. It contains items associated with both men.

Footnote: The carol's authorship was always in doubt as the original manuscript was lost until it came to light in 1995.

Bereavement Café

We are starting a monthly Bereavement Café in partnership with W&P Legal, on the first Thursday of each month 10:30am-12:00noon, at the Green School.

Our bereavement café will provide a gentle, informal space for anyone who has experienced loss. It is a safe, welcoming space to talk about bereavement or simply to spend time with others who understand. Alongside conversation, listening and pastoral support, legal professionals will be with us for some informal advice. Each month will offer time for conversation and company, as well as a themed talk or guest speaker. Topics will include practical matters such as wills, probate, and estate administration, and visiting speakers will include hospice nurses, funeral directors and grief counsellor. The café is open to anyone, regardless of how recent or long ago your bereavement occurred.

Our first taster session, themed 'letters to loved one's', is on Thursday 4th December, 10:30–12:00. As well as meeting others in a similar situation, you will have the opportunity to write a personal message on seeded paper, which can later be planted at home as a living tribute.

You are welcome to join us.

COME AND SING EVENSONG: 8th February 2026

Early next year, I will be celebrating being Director of Music at St Guthlac's for 10 years. After being Organist and Choirmaster in All Saints Sawtry for 25 years before moving to this area, it was never my intention to take on a similar role again. God had other plans and, with the warm welcome at St Guthlac's, the last 10 years have been amazing, especially having a really talented choir to work with and challenge.

Evensong at St Guthlac's has been a feature of services over many, many years as it is in many parish churches across the country. It has a special place in the hearts of many. With words taken from the 1662 Prayer Book, lots of us find comfort and solace in the pattern of the service, the words and their accompanying music. The Magnificat and Nunc Dimittis many of us can probably recite by heart and the prayers, including the Collect, 'Lighten our darkness...' show us how God supports us if we only trust in him.

February 8th 2026 will be, almost to the day, 10 years since I became Director of Music. It seems a wonderful opportunity to celebrate with a very special full **Choral Evensong**. It will be a unique service with specially written music. However, this isn't a service that you'd come and just listen to (though, of course, you could if you wanted to). On the four Saturday afternoons 17th, 24th, 31st January and 7th February at 2.00pm, we'll have rehearsals in church for anyone to come along and learn the music we can then ALL sing in the service. I'm writing a new arrangement of the Magnificat to go with one already written of the Nunc Dimittis. We'll also have a chance to practice the Psalm and Responses. During the service, the church choir will sing a specially written introit and anthem. Led by our Rector, Revd George, don't miss the chance to join in St Guthlac's first COME AND SING EVENSONG. Singing together is so much fun and, with the opportunity to praise God in our church that well predates even the prayers we'll use, it becomes so much more special!

ALL voices are welcome! You might think your voice is 'rubbish' (I've heard that so many times and it's never true). Come and give it a try. I'll be able to give hints and tips which might help you sing even better. And, of course, singing with others is definitely rewarding. It's all free and the welcome will be incredible! All music will be provided (though you don't need to be able to read music either)!

Looking back What a year we've had! New and old have successfully taken place in 2025.

The year started with improvements to the Green School – a new kitchen and toilets thanks to a grant from the UK Shared Prosperity Fund and has ended with new heating and lighting in the church – thanks to a combination of grants, generous donations and fundraising activities. In all, a total of over £110,000 raised and spent to improve our buildings. Thanks must go to the fabric team who have spent countless hours ensuring everything fitted into place properly and at the right time. Thanks too to our great God who faithfully answered all our prayers and to the PCC who, in faith, moved forward with the heating project, trusting that the money would be raised.

So many people give graciously of their time and talents to make sure events take place – such as coffee mornings, soup and social, messy church, Christian Aid lunches. We are so grateful for all our willing volunteers without whom none of these could take place.

The Garden Fete was, again, a success – also thanks to the countless volunteers who man stalls, help set up and take down. New this year are our parish lunches. The third has just taken place. They are a wonderful opportunity to meet and get to know better others in the church. These will be continuing in the New Year but we'll try not to clash with other social events!

The Quinquennial report, earlier in the year, praised us for the care and attention we lavish on our beautiful church. In February we started a 10 week Bible Course followed by a study of the book of Romans, using material prepared by the Bible Society. We hope to run this again after Easter 2026. The 2

courses have led to the formation of a Home Group which has its first meeting on 24 November.

Lenten courses ran as usual and an Advent course starts on Monday, 1 December, meeting in the Green School.

And, of course, we have a new church warden, Roger Stokoe, and we are both grateful for the 6 years of unstinting service from Pete Hilton.

Looking forward to 2026 there will be a Burns Night on 24 January (see separate article from Anne & Greg Guthrie on page 20) and the perennial Jazz Breakfast is being booked for 7 February.

So, with many thanks to all of you who support the varied activities at St Guthlac's, we wish you a very happy Christmas and a joyous New Year.

The Bethlehem Peace Light Service

We are delighted that we have been asked by the local scout groups to host a service for the reception of the Bethlehem Peace Light on December 17th and look forward to seeing the scouts, their leaders and their families in church that evening.

The Bethlehem Peace Light Campaign was started in Austria in 1986 and has grown since then to include 30 European countries and more recently USA, Canada and Mexico. Each year a child from Austria kindles a flame from the "Eternal Flame" in the Nativity Grotto in Bethlehem and takes it back to Austria for a Service of Dedication. Delegates from the other countries gather there to take the flame back with a message of peace to their own countries where it is distributed to scouting groups throughout the country.

The pictures show 9 year old Matthias Secklehner the Austrian scout who received the light from Bethlehem last year and the light being taken to Lincon Cathedral. The website www.peacelight.org.uk has much more information for those of you who are interested



in finding out more, along with pictures of other Lincolnshire hosting churches including our neighbours in Deeping St James who hosted the local service last year.
